## **Appendix**

### **Defining Departments and Programs**

Throughout this document the term *department* refers to departments and programs offering degrees in the specified discipline. This terminology is necessary because some disciplines—for example, linguistics—may be housed in stand-alone departments, exist as a program within a larger department, or be a program that extends across multiple departments. The instructions for the survey instrument directed the respondent to "please answer for your department or program in <discipline>."

### Sampling Methods and Inclusion Criteria

Using data from the National Center for Education Statistics' (NCES) Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System, we determined the number of degrees awarded from 2017 to 2021 in various disciplines as defined by the Classification of Instructional Programs (CIP). Because CIP definitions were changed for 2020, we used codes for both 2010 (for 2017–2019) and 2020 (for 2020 and 2021). We stratified the sample by Carnegie Classification (i.e., Primarily Undergraduate, Master's, and Primarily Research). We also sampled from all historically black colleges and universities (HBCUs) and predominantly black institutions (PBIs). The sampling frame included all institutions in the 50 states and the District of Columbia granting at least 5 bachelor's degrees or higher in the included disciplines between 2017 and 2021. During this period, too few HBCU/PBI institutions granted degrees in most disciplines to develop estimates. And though communication departments were fairly numerous, we received too few responses from these departments at HBCU/PBI institutions to provide estimates.

Only departments and programs that were confirmed to offer a bachelor's, master's, or doctoral degree in the specified discipline are included in this report. Departments and programs indicating in the survey that they award only a certificate, minor degree, or other microcredential in the specified discipline are not included in the results.

Because the number of HBCU/PBI departments in other disciplines was too small to sample, we were unable to provide response rates for those disciplines.

### Comparisons with Earlier Time Points

The first round of the survey in 2007 included departments in six disciplines and also combined English-LOTE departments. In each of the two following rounds of the survey (2012 and 2017), an additional four disciplines were included, bringing the number of disciplines to 14. These 14 disciplines were the basis of this round of this survey (combined departments were not included as a separate category).

It was not possible in the second or third rounds to make comparison with earlier years, because resource constraints made it impossible to resample. Without resampling, we were able to capture department deaths but none of the births, and thus any comparison between years would tell us what change occurred *in the group of institutions included in the original sample*, but not in *full population* of departments. For the 2023 round, however, we resampled every discipline and compared the data with that from the year the discipline was first included in the study. In each of those years, the sample of departments is nationally representative and thus it is possible to talk about change (if any) in the population of departments as far as enrollments, number of faculty, etc.

Disciplines are listed below by the year in which they were first included in the study. Again, this is the year with which the 2023 levels of faculty, graduate enrollment, and so on are compared. (It was not possible to estimate change in the total undergraduate enrollment question over time, as there were significant changes in the survey item over time as we attempted, ultimately unsuccessfully, to distinguish between introductory and higher-level courses.)

# Comparisons of Total Enrollment, Number of Degrees Awarded, and Number of Faculty Members

We used trends in higher education as a whole as a point of reference for our investigation of trends in humanities disciplines.

Change in higher education was not uniform from 2007 to 2023. For example, total enrollment in four-year institutions in the United States in 2007 was 11,270,929; by 2023, it was 11,511,111. However, the small increase from 2007 to 2023 hides an underlying dynamic in total enrollments at four-year institutions. That number peaked in the United States in 2010 at 13,087,182 and has been declining every year since.

Examining the number of bachelor's degrees awarded over the 2007–2023 period reveals a different picture. In the 2006–07 academic year, 1,524,729 bachelor's degrees were awarded. This number then increased yearly, reaching 2,114,168 in the 2022–23 academic year. The change in total number of faculty members at four-year institutions has mirrored that of bachelor's degrees awarded.




Figure 1: Compounded Annual Growth Rates for Three Measures over Three Time Spans

Figure 1 shows nine compounded growth rates: three each for total enrollment at four-year institutions, number of bachelor's degrees awarded, and number of faculty members—each reflecting the rate of change between the academic year of a previous study and the current (2023) iteration. To assess the dynamics in each humanities discipline, we used the corresponding growth rate as the basis for comparison.

### Statistical Significance

Statistical significance gauges the reliability of an observed difference between two estimates. It indicates how certain one can be that the difference between two estimates is not due to chance (i.e., not due to the particular sample of departments that was surveyed for the study). A difference between estimates is significant at the 5% level if, in a scenario where no real difference exists between two years, a difference as large as (or larger than) the one observed would occur only about 5% of the time (due to random variation).

### Confidence Intervals

We calculated confidence intervals to examine changes in enrollments, degrees awarded, and the number of faculty members in each discipline.

In assessing the difference between two estimates, one must consider the uncertainty associated with each of them. To do so, we draw a "confidence interval" around each estimated difference. The intervals reported here represent the range of estimates that researchers would expect to see 95% of the time if they could repeat the study infinitely many times with different samples from the same population.

### Changes in the Distribution of Faculty Employment

We used the  $\chi^2$  (chi-squared) test to examine the distribution of faculty members across four employment categories: tenured; tenure-track; full-time nontenure-track; and part-time nontenure-track. While this test can determine differences in distributions, there is no accepted *post hoc* test to determine the source of the difference.

When analyzing the data, the sum of the answers to this item often did not equal the total number of students enrolled in graduate-level courses. Our initial solution was to readjust the enrollments by faculty member type numbers if they were within +/- 10% of the total enrollment in graduate-level courses at that department or program and to exclude cases outside that adjustment window. This solution worked well for the item asking about undergraduate enrollment by faculty type, as we had a large enough number of responding departments to work with. For the item on graduate enrollment by faculty type, this method proved unworkable because the number of departments offering graduate-level courses was much lower, especially for smaller humanities disciplines. In the present study, we were able to report the total number of enrollments in graduate-level courses but were unable to report these totals by faculty type.
