## Oklahoma's Humanities Majors at Work: What They Earn, What They Do

In the first study of its kind, the Humanities Indicators developed a series of profiles about the career outcomes of humanities majors residing in Oklahoma and the other 49 states, drawing on data from the U.S. Census Bureau's American Community Survey.

## Among the key findings:

- The 31,738 humanities graduates residing in Oklahoma and working full-time account for 2% of the state's full-time workforce (looking across all the states, the average share is 4%). Bear in mind that only 31% of the state's full-time workers have a bachelor's degree, so humanities graduates account for approximately 8% of that share.
- The median earnings of humanities majors in the state's full-time workforce (\$54,764 per year) are 40% higher than the median earnings of workers with just a high school degree (\$39,137). Even those at the bottom quartile of earnings for graduates from the humanities (\$40,235) are earning \$1,098 more than the median for those in the workforce with just a high school diploma. One in four humanities graduates in the state earns more than \$83,075.
- The median earnings for humanities majors in Oklahoma are similar to or higher than the earnings of graduates from the behavioral and social sciences, arts, and education. Their earnings are lower than those of graduates from the natural sciences and business (by 21% for each category). Engineering graduates earn substantially more than college graduates from every other field, both nationally and in Oklahoma.
- The unemployment rate for humanities majors is similar to other college graduates in Oklahoma at 3%, and lower than the rate for those in the labor force with just a high school degree (6%).
- Humanities graduates in Oklahoma are most likely to be found in education occupations, with 19% employed in that category.
- Older humanities graduates make considerably more than their younger counterparts. Full-time workers aged 22–26 have median earnings of \$33,186, but that rises to \$57,922 for those aged 30–59.

- Humanities graduates in Oklahoma with an advanced degree have a 27% boost in median earnings (rising from \$51,496 for full-time workers with just a bachelor's degree to \$65,586 for workers with a higher degree).
- Areas of employment with substantial shares of humanities graduates include the legal and museum/library professions (where humanities graduates account for 22% of bachelor's degree holders employed in each occupation). Approximately 10% of college graduates working in the notfor-profit sector majored in the humanities.

Note that unless otherwise specified, earnings and unemployment estimates are for workers aged 25–59.
